

We had 36 graduates in the Class of 2023. The Class of 2023 was awarded \$3,563,351 in academic, athletic, and special achievement scholarships and awards. These thirty six graduates accepted packages totaling \$1,785,547. Two of these graduates signed to compete in athletics at the college level.

Our Varsity girls won the State Championship in soccer in the spring.



This year, we welcomed 597 students back to school, our highest enrollment.



This year, we have 38 seniors. Four have been awarded National Merit Semi-finalists (pictured).



Four students scored a perfect score of 36 on their ACT.

80% of our Upper School students participate on an athletic team. We also offer Lower School teams for basketball, volleyball, and cross country.

We had a great season of fall sports this year.

This fall our cross country teams had a strong showing, competing in 5A against much larger schools. Our varsity girls cross country team won sectionals and the varsity boys team finished second. Both teams finished fourth at the state meet.





Seventh grade student Elliot Wilson finished third in the 200 Freestyle at the State Meet and is now the first Westminster girl to win an individual medal!



In our first indoor track meet, Westminster participated in 25 events and had 20 personal records. We had 3 Top 5 all-time Indoor performances. Our 4x800 teams received medals: Boys - Bronze (school record performance) and Girls - 6th place. (pictured above)

Each year, the Westminster Fine Arts department performs two productions. The spring production of Agatha Christie's Witness for the Prosecution and the fall production of Oscar Wilde's On the Importance of Being Earnest (pictured below) were both wonderful.
